Enjoy Spring Safely

Now that I've seen my first robin and first blooming daffodil, I know that spring is here and it's time to start thinking about gardening, always with my dogs in mind. A good first step at this early stage of spring is to inspect the back yard,

looking for gaps in the fences and picking up any trash that may have blown in. I also look for broken branches and twigs, especially those that have thorns.

Naturally, insecticides, herbicides, and fertilizers are dangerous for

pets. Snail and slug baits can be extremely toxic, even fatal. Spring is a good time to check that these items are stored safely and out of reach of pets. Some people change their coolant in their cars in spring. Be sure to clean up any spills and store

anti-freeze safely as it is very toxic to cats and dogs. The sweet smell and taste attract animals to it.

Later in spring, mulching to preserve moisture is a common task in our dry climate. There have been reports of dogs dying after eating large amounts of cocoa mulch. "Most mulches are safe, but cocoa bean mulch is made from the hulls of cocoa beans and when fresh has a rich, chocolate aroma. Ingestion of large amounts of fresh mulch can result in chocolate toxicity." (PetPlace.com, <https://store.petplace.com/dogs/lawn-garden-hazards-in-dogs/page1.aspx>) Chocolate contains caffeine and theobromine, which are toxic in large amounts. I like to use shredded cedar mulch, which isn't nearly as interesting to chew on and not toxic like cocoa mulch. Some of the new rubber based mulches might be attractive to dogs that like to chew. These probably won't hurt dogs unless they swallow enough to block their intestines.

In springtime, Easter comes with several hazards for dogs. All candy can be

problematic, but chocolate is particularly dangerous. Decorations can be hazardous if chewed and swallowed, especially the ever popular plastic grass to line Easter baskets. This can block the intestines of a dog if swallowed.

My dogs like to roll in the dead grass in the spring, so I check them frequently and carefully for burrs, plant seeds, and thorns. I run my hands over their entire bodies searching for stickers and then check between the toes and pads on each foot. Ears and eyes also need to be checked, however this needs to be done gently. Removing stickers before they work their way into the skin avoids infections and pain for the little guys.

Many garden plants can be dangerous for dogs, and in fact, I have found several plants in my yard listed as hazardous. I don't panic and rip out the plants but try to use common sense when deciding what plants can stay. For example, daffodil bulbs are toxic, but very, very few Chihuahuas will dig 6-8 inches to get at them. I do, however, check lists of hazardous plants before adding new plants to the garden. ■

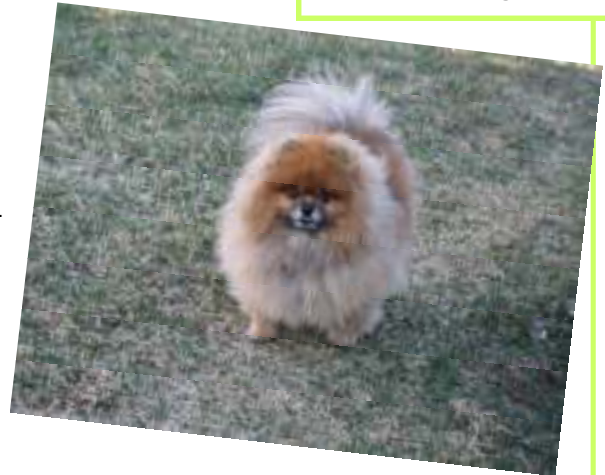

We had read Rosa's story and arranged to meet her in Denver. On September 14th we made the trip to Denver to meet Rosa and her foster mom, Jamie. When we arrived, we saw Rosa sitting in her foster mom's carrying pouch.

Rosa looked very calm, with her paws folded over one another in a very lady-like fashion. After conversing for some time with Jamie and holding Rosa, we decided that this was going to be the right fit for us and went ahead with the adoption. It was an emotional parting for Rosa and Jamie, and we appreciated how hard it was for a foster parent to part with their adoptee after working so long to acclimate the dogs to a normal home life. With a few tears shed by all involved, we departed Denver with Rosa.

Rosa was very quiet that first week, spending most of her day in bed with her ears down. We recognized that this time was a difficult transition for her and coaxed her out as much as we could, letting her adjust in her own way. Rosa immediately loved our back yard, as often as we could we let her out to enjoy the sunshine. After several days, Rosa began to wonder out of her bed more and more. She seemed to trust Michelle most of all and would brighten up every time she walked into the room. Soon Rosa's tail started wagging, and Michelle could coax her to go outside just by calling her. Rosa now gets totally silly every time Michelle walks into a room, lying on her back, tail wagging, belly exposed and paws posed at her face, just begging for a belly rub.
